From the Director:

We believe that parents are their child's first and most important teacher and by working together we can further the vision and intent of the agency's mission.

PACT has a long history in the West Central Illinois area, and since the beginning of Head Start services in our area, the above statement has held true. Throughout the last two years of national and world-wide upheaval, it continues to hold true. We have seen tremendous strength, patience, and perseverance in our PACT families, staff, and our community partners.

Although our total enrollment was down and children's services changed, we saw positives from 2020-2021:

Staff made extra efforts to distribute books, materials, and learning activities to families throughout the year when quarantines and COVID-19 cases caused interruptions for in-person services and home visits. Home-based families gravitated to the virtual socializations (increased from 14% to 66% of home-based families) hosted by home-based teachers. These gatherings gave them opportunities to socialize with other young parents and families.

More children (65%) met the goal for completing home activities with their families; an increase of 11 percent.

Five percent more of our children (61%) met the 1-hour per week goal of reading with family members. Medical exams in both Head Start and Early Head Start increased slightly while dental exams decreased a few percent during this year.

Forty percent of PACT staff are current or former parents in the program which is a win for the program and the families. While we are facing early childhood educator staffing challenges in our program, we are grate-ful for our staff that have met milestones in their careers with PACT.

On behalf of the staff, management team, Policy Council, and Board of Directors, PACT would like to thank

our community partners for supporting our families and services during the pandemic. PACT services and families benefit from strong community-based organizations and schools that build up young families. Keeping family relationships strong is key to the success of PACT, as well as to the well-being of our world!

Head Start is a nationwide program funded by the Administration for Children and Families. It is designed to provide learning experiences for families and children with limited incomes or disabilities, from prenatal and ages birth to 5 years. PACT receives two grants (Head Start and Early Head Start) to serve families in Adams, Brown, Cass, Hancock, McDonough, Pike, Scott, and Schuyler counties in Illinois.

Head Start serves three- and four-year old children in center classes. Early Head Start serves prenatal women and children up to 3 years old in a home-based program (90 minute weekly visits) or full-day services for families, with priority for parents that work or are in school/training.

Child Care - At some centers where Early Head Start or full-day Head Start services are operated, PACT provides wraparound child care for parents who may be working or in school outside of the regular hours of operation. There is a charge for this service. Child care fees may be based on IDHS Child Care Assistance Program, if applicable to the family. The parent portion of the DHS co-pay, or PACT's child care fee will be assessed when completing enrollment for child care.

PACT has a collaborative agreement with Western Illinois University to provide child care services for the WIU students and staff. The PACT Head Start/WIU Child Care Center has been a partner in the ExceleRate Illinois quality rating system for early learning programs since 2013, and is at the Silver Circle of Quality. PACT's four other centers joined and are maintaining the Silver Circles of Quality.

What Does PACT Provide?

Education: Learning activities that lead to development in areas of approaches to learning, social and emotional, language and literacy, cognition, and perceptual, motor, and physical. Staff use The Creative Curriculum and Parents As Teachers (PAT) curriculums in the classrooms and home visits, respectively.

Social Services: Staff connect families with community services, and assist families to achieve personal, educational and individual family goals.

Parent Engagement: Parents receive education through home visits, family events, parent committees, parent initiated activities, and workshops. Parents are responsible for the direction of the programs through the Policy Council, an elected group of parents that works cooperatively with the Board of Directors.

Health: PACT assists with physical examinations, other age appropriate health screenings, and oral health and nutritional assessments.

Special Services: At least 10% of all enrollment is reserved for children with diagnosed disabilities. Services can be provided based on the needs of the child and the wishes of the family. Foster children and homeless children also receive priority for enrollment. PACT does not deny enrollment based on a disability or a chronic health condition or its severity.





Getting Families Involved

Parent Engagement-An annual satisfaction survey is distributed to all PACT parents. For the 20-21 program year, we received 150 completed surveys. Of those, 95% stated they were fully satisfied with the services offered and would strongly recommend the PACT program to others.


<u>**Transportation**</u> - PACT has four buses and transports approximately 66 children to and from classrooms.





Family Participation - Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, family events were not held during the 20-21 program year. PACT implemented the Ready Rosie curriculum to communicate with families and engage them in activities with their children ages birth to five. We had 44 Head Start families and 144 Early Head Start families access activities through the application. Parents in the Home-Based program also participated in virtual socializations throughout the program year.

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



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

The Office of Head Start uses the Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS) during its on-site reviews of grantees. The CLASS tool has 10 dimensions of teacher-child interactions rated on a 7 point scale, from low to high. The CLASS dimensions are organized into 3 domains: Emotional Support-assesses the degree to which teachers establish and promote a positive climate in their classroom through every day interactions.

Classroom Organization-assesses classroom routines and procedures related to the organization and management of children's behavior, time & attention in the classroom.

Instructional Support-assesses the ways in which teachers implement the curriculum to effectively promote cognitive and language development.

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2020/2021 School Readiness Goals

School Readiness Statement: Parent and Child Together (PACT) believes that relationships with families, schools and communities are the foundation for school readiness. Developing those relationships will assist us in creating safe and nurturing experiences which support young children to develop their individual interests, talents and goals to become successful lifelong learners.

Approaches to Learning

Children will develop the ability to stay focused, interested and engaged in experiences.

Social Emotional Children will develop social relationships and self regulation.

Perceptual, Motor and Physical Development

Children will understand and maintain safe and healthy practices. Children will achieve control of large and small muscles for movement, balance, self care and exploration.

Language and Literacy

Children will develop the ability to use and understand English and/or home language.


Cognitive

Family Engagement Outcomes

Our family engagement goals focus on three things families can do to make a big impact on their child's education. We believe those three things are attendance, home work and reading. Data for the 2020-21 program year is based on services through the Summer 2021 reporting period.

Attendance:

66% of home based families attended at least one socialization.

52% of all children met the attendance goal for home visits or classroom attendance.

Home Work

65% of all children met the goal for completing at home activities with their families (home work).

Reading

56% of all children met the goal for reading with their families 1 hour a week.
